# **Alameda County's Budgeting Process**

This is the time of the year that County leadership works together on next year's budget. In April, the Alameda County Board of Supervisors heard public budget presentations from County departments and began to hold budget work sessions to help inform the development of the County's Fiscal Year 2024-25 Proposed Budget. The County's budget will determine how billions of taxpayer dollars in the next Fiscal Year, July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025, will be spent in five main areas – health care services, public assistance programs, public protection, general government, and capital projects. These five areas make up nearly 90% of the county's budget of over four billion dollars.



Alameda County is committed to an open and transparent budget process to ensure inclusiveness, accountability and trust. In the ensuing weeks, the Board of Supervisors, County

Administrator, County Agency and Department heads, labor representatives, and various community stakeholders will meet to discuss budget policy impacts and reconcile their needs with available resources.

A critical aspect of this process includes the County Administrator's analysis of the proposed budgets submitted by County Departments and Agencies, and determining any Fiscal Year 2024-2025 funding gap. The funding gap is the difference between the cost of maintaining current services and available financing. For Fiscal Year 2024-25, the current Alameda County budget gap is estimated to be \$68 million. This funding gap is targeted for budget balancing through the collaborative effort among all of the stakeholders identified above.

Another critical aspect of this process involves an analysis of how State and Federal funding and policy decisions will impact Alameda County residents and possibly the estimated funding gap. This analysis will be conveyed through reports that will be included in the Proposed and Final Budget documents.

In May and June, County departments will make any necessary adjustments to their initial proposals for final consideration by the Board of Supervisors. The Proposed Budget is scheduled to be presented to the Board in early June.

The Board will subsequently hold hearings for the public to offer comments to the Proposed Budget. This will be an important opportunity for Alameda County residents, businesses, and organizations to share their thoughts and feedback. The County anticipates receiving input and insights on how the Proposed Budget will impact significant issues affecting Alameda County and its safety net services and programs. After several public hearings, the Board will vote to adopt the balanced Final Budget no later than June 30, 2024. #### **Implementation of ID E-Verification System**



I am pleased to announce that our office has implemented a new online system to verify user identification to expedite ordering copies of birth, death and marriage certificates online. On April 9, and pursuant to Assembly Bill 751, our Agency's Clerk-Recorder's Office began using this system and we have received positive feedback from community members. Prior to this service, customers either had to submit a notarized authorization statement or pick up the

order in person, presenting identification during the pickup. The ID e-verification system streamlines the process for both staff and customers by reducing the need for manual ID verification. Now, customers can verify their identity online when requesting unrestricted copies of birth, death, or marriage records. This service offers a significant benefit to customers by decreasing wait and travel times, notary costs and other expenses. We estimate that it will collectively provide a savings to our customers of approximately \$800,000 per year!

# **Apostille Pop-Up Shop**

On April 30th, the Alameda County Auditor-Controller/Clerk-Recorder

Agency, together with the California Secretary of State's Office, hosted an incredibly successful Apostille Pop-Up Shop at the Dublin Public Library – about a mile away from the Clerk-Recorder's Tri-Valley Office located at 7600 Dublin Blvd. An Apostille is a certificate that authenticates the signature of a public official on a document for use in another country.

The turnout was impressive with nearly 600 Californians attending, many travelling to Alameda County from neighboring counties such as San Joaquin, Santa Clara, San Mateo and San Francisco counties. "Partnering with Alameda County for the Apostille Pop-Up



Shop event exemplifies our dedication to serving Californians, wherever they may be," said California Secretary of State Shirley N. Weber, Ph.D. Even though the event did not open until 8:30am, people were already lined up as early as 7:00am!

Despite the tremendous turnout, which was unexpected, attendees remained patient and appreciative. They all were just happy to receive Apostille services without having to make the long trip to Sacramento. Many who attended inquired about future events and expressed delight that their tax dollars were being put to good use. Additionally, attendees praised the convenient location and free parking provided by the Dublin Public Library.

#### County Auditors Convene at State Conference

Our collective work throughout the state of California ensures that public funds are disbursed in accordance with local and state regulations. Laws and rules constantly evolve and best practices change, and this conference equips us with the necessary resources to perform our duties effectively.
